OSHA Proposed Emergency Response Standard – 29CFR1910.156

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Overview

- 02/05/2024 OSHA published a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) to modernize the "Fire Brigades" standard with a new "Emergency Response Standard."
- Some of the new requirements would be very burdensome if not impossible for volunteer fire and emergency service departments to comply with.


2. Click on the **SUBMIT A FORMAL COMMENT** tab

- Select the **PROPOSED RULES in the drop down** under the What is your comment about?



What should my comment letter contain?



How to draft your comment letter

- Start with an opening paragraph that provides the name of the proposed rule (Emergency Response Standard), the rule number (29 CFR 1910), and a brief overview of the points your comment letter makes.
- 2. Describe your department to OSHA.
 - How many members on your department?
 - What's your budget?
 - What's the area you serve look like?
 - Do you have the funds to comply with this proposed standard?
 - Do you have the staffing to comply?

How to draft your comment letter (continued)

- 3. How would your area be negatively impacted if your department had to shut down due to this standard?
- 4. Does your department rely on fundraising for much of your income?
- Provide a detailed explanation of what is at stake for you and your emergency services organization because of the proposed rule.
 Be specific, but do not overestimate costs.

The next slide will share examples how to construct each argumen

Construct each argument like this:

- A. Provide your main argument, the *claim.* For example, "the proposed standard addresses many risks that may not be relevant to small departments like ours that don't encounter many emergency calls."
- B. Provide *evidence* for that claim. Supply supporting materials that demonstrate, clearly and specifically, the evidence that supports your argument. Federal agencies prefer hard numbers, but examples help too.



Construct each argument like this: (continued)

C. Provide the *impact*. Explain to the regulators you are writing to why your data matters. Don't worry about over-explaining. Regulators prefer clarity.




How to draft your comment letter (continued)

- 3. Make clear requests or recommendations to improve the rule. For instance:
 - A delay to provide more time to comply.
 - A revision to a specific part of the rule.
 - Exclusion for a particular part of your industry that may not be contributing to the problem the rule seeks to address.
- 4. Finally, provide a summary paragraph of your comments. Close with a word of thanks to the agency for considering your comments.
